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What is Cat's Claw?

Cat's Claw Creeper Vine (*Macfadyena unguis-cati*), originating in Central and South America, is an aggressive climbing vine, once commonly used as an ornamental plant in Queensland gardens.

In October and November, you will see flushes of yellow flowers in the canopies of infested shrubs and trees along roadsides, creeks and edges of bushland. Its aggressive growth habit and vigorous root and tuber system allows it to establish quickly if left unmanaged. The vine produces prolific papery-winged seeds and can also establish via tuber dispersal during flood events.



Why it is a problem?



Cat's Claw Creeper Vine is now one of the key invasive weed species threatening the integrity and function of local waterways within the Noosa and adjacent shires. It is known as a 'transformer' weed as it can transform the composition and structure of entire vegetation communities.

Without management Cat's Claw smothers ground and canopy vegetation, kills trees, exposes waterways to light and increases the risk of erosion. Cat's Claw Creeper Vine threatens remnant corridors of the Critically Endangered rainforest communities in the upper Noosa and Mary River Catchments. These areas are home to threatened species including the Mary River Cod, Giant Barred Frog, Coxen's Fig Parrot, Southern Penda and Jointed Baloghia.



Madeira Vine

Madeira Vine (*Anredera cordifolia*) is a vigorous climber and another serious transformer weed that can degrade intact native forests, completely altering the environments it dominates.
